End-of-Year Tests and Assessments for 7 and 11 year-olds in 2016

Pupil Premium Impact Report - Year 2

Pupil Premium Funding is additional money that comes into the school budget to support pupils who are entitled to free school meals. The money is used to provide extra support and resources to help children do as well as they possibly can. The rigorously marked tests and assessments at the end of each Key Stage (year 2 and Year 6) are used as evidence to show that this extra help results in good standards for all our children.

Assessment in summer 2016 was different from previous years - children had to undertake harder tests. From these assessments we can see how well pupils entitled to extra help, funded through the pupil premium grant, did. We can see what percentage of this group reached the new, expected standard.

Additionally, we can work out how the results of the group not entitled to this additional funding compared to those of their classmates.

Note: Very small class and pupil group sizes. This means it is difficult to compare, so we should be careful about generalisations. However, the figures show that the pupil premium group is not lagging behind in this year group, except in writing. This will be a focus for the group as they move into Year 3. Parents will be assured that we see our children as individuals and make sure we help each child do as well as they possibly can.

Pupil Premium Impact Report - Year 6

The new Year 6 tests of 2016 are not comparable with the tests of previous years. There is no national data available yet about how different groups of children have performed. However, we can compare the scores (100 is the expected score) of our group of pupils who are eligible for free school meals with those who are not eligible. The school receives extra funding for children who are entitled to free school meals - the Pupil Premium Grant - to use for extra staffing and resources (see our Spending Forecast for more details)

Overall, all groups had an average score of 100+; the negative gap between the PP group and Non-PP group remains (as expected nationally); the biggest gap is in Reading and the smallest is in Mathematics. The Pupil Premium Group found the greatest challenge to be the Reading Test, with 3 pupils falling below the expected standard. This will be an on-going focus in the whole school curriculum as we get used to the new tests. Again, we have to be careful about making generalisations with very small numbers.
